

New Executive Director for Read Write Spell

Because children's literacy is a critical factor in breaking the cycle of generational poverty, **Read Write Spell** remains a crucial ministry commitment of St. Paul's. Yet, when Executive Director Kris Cox stepped down last fall, we were not exactly sure what our next move should be because we were in the midst of so many "unknowns."

How long would the pandemic last, and would there be a vaccine? How would the duration of the pandemic affect our tutoring work? The school system was going to hire a new superintendent: would that person still want to partner with us? These unknowns made it unclear what kind of leader **Read Write Spell** would need next and what sorts of skills they should have.

However, in the spring of 2021, as some of these "unknowns" became "knowns," something else became apparent as well:

we already had the leader for which we were looking. Esharan Monroe-Johnson's work as interim Executive Director clarified that **Read Write Spell** was already in the right hands and headed in the right direction. I am thrilled to see Esharan formally take the reins and continue the outstanding work she began last fall. She brings a wealth of knowledge, deep skills in



leadership and management, and an unparalleled passion for the work. It is my privilege and pleasure to welcome Esharan Monroe-Johnson as **Read Write Spell**'s next Executive Director.

Letter from the Executive Director

Over the last 15 months, we have had to create new avenues to advance our mission. To keep everyone safe during the 2020-2021 school year, **Read Write Spell** volunteers could not work in schools. This was an obstacle to our work. However, thanks to the support of our donors, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, and the outstanding dedication of the **Read Write Spell** staff and advisory board, we were able to find new pathways to continue serving children, educators, and families during the pandemic.

As we head back into the schools to work with students, we are faced with a new challenge. The impact of COVID on children's literacy in this community is profound. The End of Grade test scores were released in September, and only 39.4% of Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools (WS/FCS) third graders are proficient in reading. This is a significant decrease from the 51.7% of third-graders who were proficient in reading in the 2018-2019 school year, a number that was already too low. Yet, we remain hopeful because we know that 95% of

children can learn to read with instruction rooted in reading science which is the foundation of our programs.

WS/FCS has set a goal of 90% of third-grade students proficient in reading by 2025. This goal is ambitious, but it is possible if the entire community-non-profit organizations, businesses, and community organizations— works together to reach it. The children in this community need us to end this literacy crisis now.



Defining the Science of Reading

Building on the premise that literacy is essential for individual and community success, **Read Write Spell** works to increase reading proficiency among children in Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Schools. All of our programs are based on the science of reading.

The science of reading refers to decades of research from multiple disciplines on how children learn to read, how to intervene when someone has difficulty learning to read, and how to improve reading skills. The research shows that explicit, sequential, systematic, code-based reading instruction is necessary for 50%-60% of children and all children benefit from this type of instruction.



Our Work

Volunteer Tutoring Susan and Amiya: A success story

When Amiya was in the 4th grade she had difficulty with reading. Her teacher reached out to **Read Write Spell** for a tutor and I was assigned to work with her. When we started, Amiya did not know what a consonant was. We worked hard and slowly but surely, Amiya learned one-syllable words and then two-syllable words. Every lesson ended by reading a story together. By the 3rd quarter, Amiya's grades markedly improved. She was keeping up with her classmates. She was delighted and surprised when she started to get A's and B's regularly.

Amiya just finished the 6th grade and came for tutoring in the office last year. It was important for me to continue tutoring

Our Work

Deepening Our Partnership with WS/FCS

With the pause in tutoring this school year we had to be innovative in our approach to advancing our mission. As we looked for ways to increase our impact while not tutoring in schools we reached out the WS/FCS to see what else we could do. We are happy to announce that **Read Write Spell** provided funding for 17 district leaders and coaches to receive LETRS. This will allow them to support teachers who will start LETRS training over the next two years and work to implement the science of reading in their classrooms.

Write Spell has served as a community partner with WS/FCS for many years. The vision of Read Write Spell to transform our community so every child learns to read, write, and spell is in direct alignment with our Superintendent's goal to achieve 90% third grade reading proficiency by 2025. We share a collaborative understanding between WS/FCS and Read Write Spell to support early literacy and increase student reading proficiency... By building the capacity of our district leaders and coaches who directly support all elementary schools, the district will be able to coach and guide teachers as they receive the LETRS training over the next two years.?

Well Read Well Fed

In the summer of 2020, with our programs on pause because of COVID, we wanted to make sure that children still had access to books while the schools and libraries were closed. Thanks to the generous support of two of our donors we were able to purchase a truck of 35,000 new books and Well Read Well Fed Forsyth was born. Well Read, Well Fed Forsyth is a coordinated collaboration that provides books and literacy resources to the families that receive food and other support from our partners. The goal of Well Read, Well Fed Forsyth is to provide high-

quality, culturally relevant books to the most vulnerable school-aged children in the county and to connect with parents who might need us to provide them with resources and support to ensure that their child/children can read proficiently. To date, we have distributed 26,500 books to children all over Forsyth County.

26,500 BOOKS

have been donated to kids all over Forsyth County!

Families coming to GreeNest for furniture now have the opportunity to also get books. And that's thanks to you all. It's such a nice treat that [clients] come in often with their children and we allow them to go to our bookshelves where we have the bags of books you all have provided, and in addition to having new furniture in their homes that before were empty, now they also have books to read. Letter from Board Chair

Despite the closure of our public schools and subsequent lack of tutoring, the year 2021 provides **Read Write Spell** a momentous opportunity to realize our vision: To advance the Science of Reading by teaching, training, and advocating, with a goal of achieving 90%+ reading proficiency in Forsyth County. Why?

First, Esharan Monroe-Johnson is now the permanent Executive Director of **Read Write Spell**. She will provide the leadership required to realize our mission.

Second, she has created a partnership with the WS/FCS administration to support their efforts to implement the Science of Reading, to realize their goal of reaching 90%+ third grade reading proficiency IN ALL SCHOOLS by 2025.

Third, the NC General Assembly has passed legislation that requires the use of the Science of Reading in teaching reading in all public schools throughout the state. It stresses the re-training of all teachers, as well as literacy intervention for all students

falling below grade proficiency levels. Already, we have funded initial training for WS/FCS administrative personnel this summer. We will support teacher training, and offer tutoring to assist WS/FCS in complying with the NC legislation.

In order to do this, we will need your help. I ask you to watch the **Read Write Spell** Rise and Read video and share it with everyone
